

Rationale for Legend Design (Chronology Jump List)

Rationale for Legend Design (Chronology Jump List)

The current legend in the Chronology jump list intentionally includes only the four categories of **official records** (Custody, Crime, CAD, Date). "Probative" is not shown in the swatch legend by design.

Reasons:

1. Priority on Official Records

Reviewers' initial need is to locate official records quickly. The colour patches and icons in the jump list support this by foregrounding categories with direct legal status.

2. Probative Evidence in Context

Probative items are discovered within the chronology entries, not as standalone targets. They are rendered in purple with an italic "Probative:" label, visually consistent with the evidence category but not competing with official records.

3. Workflow Alignment

The jump list scrolls counsel to the relevant context first. Evidence gains value only when presented in situ. By excluding "Probative" from the legend, the design enforces good reading discipline: understand the event, then consult supporting documents.

4. Cognitive Efficiency

Reducing legend clutter ensures fast pattern recognition. When reviewers see purple probative links in context, the colour continuity naturally clicks with the jump list scheme.

Conclusion:

The omission of "Probative" from the swatch legend is a deliberate design choice. It highlights official records for orientation, while probative documents are contextually integrated. This approach avoids visual overload and mirrors the evidentiary reasoning process expected in legal review.
